Admission Requirements

(In years as established by the college)

A high school diploma with the following specific courses:

- 4 English
- 2 Algebra I & II
- 1 Geometry
- 2 Lab Science (*including biology*)
- 2 History/Social Studies
- 2 Foreign Language (*same language or two years of American Sign Language-ASL*)
Academic electives (*to equal at least 17 total credits*)

To ensure current mathematical skills, students should take a mathematics course during their senior year of high school.

Major Requirements

- Demonstration of listening comprehension, oral, reading and writing proficiency. Students who have not received at least a *B* in GER 305/306 may be required to take a test in language skills.
- 30 credits above intermediate level
- 15 hours of which must be 400 level German courses.
- German 305, 306, 307 or equivalent.
- Highly recommended: 1) Study Abroad Junior Year in Salzburg, 2) HTY 426: History of Modern Germany

Minor Requirements

- A minimum of 18 credit hours in German, 12 credit hours of which are above the intermediate level (GER 204, GER 223).

120 Minimum total credit hours required for graduation

Program Description

Courses are offered in German language, literature, linguistics, culture. There are two tracks for the beginning and intermediate student: the traditional, 4 semester sequence of German, and an accelerated program -Schnelldeutsch- wherein the student takes an intensive, two semester program in German. Many programs throughout the University of Maine require or recommend the successful completion of 6 credit hours of a foreign language, or proven proficiency in a foreign language through the intermediate level as an integral component of their majors. Students planning to teach a foreign language need to complete a major program in the department, as well as 18 credit hours in a subject commonly taught in high school (i.e., history, English, mathematics, etc.)

Along with courses on German language, linguistics, literature, and culture, the German Program offers courses in Practical German, which emphasizes "authentic" language situations in business, the sciences, etc. Future teachers have access to courses leading to German teaching certification, including MLC 466: The Teaching of Modern Languages.

There are several study abroad options for German students; we are part of a consortium that send students to Salzburg, Austria, for their Junior Year Abroad. All students (not just language majors or minors) are encouraged to make study abroad part of their educational experience.

The International Affairs/German major combines 24 credit hours above intermediate level in German with course work in anthropology, economics, history, and political science.

The German Minor. The German minor combines well with programs such as Business Administration (international business), Education, Engineering, Journalism, Sciences, and the Arts.

Internships have offered opportunities to students majoring in German. Some examples: Research/Editorial Assistant, Foreign Policy Research Analyst, work in private and public language schools and programs; travel tour guide, Research Assistants; graduate study.

Career Opportunities

Career options for students majoring in German include: teachers, study abroad coordinators, travel consultants, translators, hotel services, international corporations, higher education admissions counselors, communications and journalism, and law. A foreign language is a skill which enhances job possibilities in every field: library sciences, medical and social services. In a global society, the knowledge of another language and culture is a positive aspect and of increased importance in finding employment.

Graduates from this MAINE program have entered such positions as: NASDA Licensing Technician, New England Mutual Life Insurance; Language Consultant, Inlingua School of Languages; Cartographer, James W. Sewell Company; Linguist, National Security Agency; Foreign Language Teacher, Chewonki Foundation; Admissions Counselor, University of Maine at Fort Kent; Chief of Telecommunications, The Lafayette Hotel; Teacher, Peace Corps; Director, Young and Alive Daycare Center; Admissions Counselor, Westbrook College.

**All UMaine students must complete these general education requirements, which are counted in the total credit hours required for graduation and may be contained in the Major Requirements previously listed.*

Specialized Information

The department also offers a minor in French, German, Latin or Spanish. The minors are open to all undergraduate, degree-seeking University of Maine students and require the completion of 12 credit hours of coursework in the desired minor.

All students, not only foreign language majors, are strongly encouraged to study abroad for a period of time during their undergraduate career. Among the most popular and successful opportunities are the CIEE Program at Rennes, France; Junior Year Abroad in Salzburg, Austria; the Second Semester (CJW) Program in Germany for first-year students; and the CIEE Program in Seville and Alicante, Spain; as well as Argentina and the Dominican Republic.

Students may also major in French and Spanish and take the appropriate classes leading to an M.B.A. in the program which was developed in cooperation with the College of Business, Public Policy and Health.

Graduate Study

Students have gone on at this institution for Individualized Doctor of Philosophy degree programs in German. Graduates have also gone on for a Master of Arts or Doctor of Philosophy degree at such institutions as Rutgers, Cornell, the State University of New York at Buffalo, the University of Illinois, Bowling Green State University, the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, Purdue University, the University of California and Harvard.

In addition, graduates have received prestigious Fulbright Grants to study in Europe. Some former students have received advanced degrees in Literature and Language, others in Linguistics, Bilingual Education and Pedagogy.

Our students have gone on to teach in high schools and universities throughout the country.
